Global Rescue Recommended by the Hunting and Angling Report

Global Rescue closes the final link in providing medical evacuation service. They are the new gold standard by which all other services will be judged. The key innovation behind Global Rescue is the company's use of highly trained military people — Air Force Pararescue personnel, Navy Seals, Army Special Forces operatives, Marine Force Reconnaissance members - to plan and execute all of its evacuations. It is individuals of this caliber that Global Rescue has hired, put on retainer or simply put on standby.

The military people Global Rescue has on call provide the company with the capability to react to an emergency anywhere in the world – from the middle of the ocean... to the Pamirs... to remote parts of Africa and South America. It was, in fact, a rescue that Global Rescue performed in South America recently that sealed my

decision to go with the firm. Seems a hiker in Colca Canyon, Peru, lost his footing earlier this year and tumbled down the side of the canyon in a very remote area. A MedJetAssist member, he called for assistance and was told he would be assisted only when he made his way to Lima — an impossibility in his condition. At that point, a member of the hiking party called Global Rescue, who had a helicopter in the canyon the next morning.

What the founder, Daniel Richards, has done is change the whole conversation about services of this sort. He's raised the bar to a level no one had conceived of before.
